LETTER FROM PASTOR LORI Money Matters

I learned many things from my father. One of them is my attitude towards money.

Like most of us, money was complicated for my father. Born in 1930, he grew up on a farm during the depression followed by the austere years of World War II. He served in the Korean War, followed that up with college (thanks, GI Bill!) and graduate school, finally starting his career at ISU at the age of 38. Because of this, Dad always felt "behind" in earning and saving, and this was a worry for him.

Money was tight growing up, with anxiety around car repairs, needing a new roof, that kind of thing. Our family didn't spend as much at Christmas, or buy the top clothing brands, like others did. I realize now that some of that was economics, but it was also because my parents didn't place value on things.

Occasionally, Dad did things that seemed beyond frugal—like one summer day when he finished a glass of iced tea and then put it in the freezer so he could use the ice cubes again. Later, I realized that action came from his deep sense of responsibility and stewardship. He would say, You can only spend money one time. Dad believed there was a responsible way to spend that money and use all of our resources.

But Dad was also incredibly generous. When I graduated and got my first job teaching in Minnesota, I bought a new to me car and he offered to pay for my car insurance for the first year. He did that kind of thing for all three of us, and he would always tell us, I'm grateful to be able to help you kids like my dad was able to help me.

His generosity was not limited to family. My parents always took their pledge to our church very seriously, trying to increase their giving each year, working toward giving ten percent. As we kids became financially responsible, Dad wrote more checks to support groups that did work in areas important to him—the environment, education, economic opportunity and justice. Dad believed that we should all share what we have, as we are able.

I am so grateful for what my father modeled in his life.

How about you? What did your family teach you about money as you grew up? What events and experiences have shaped you? I invite you to reflect on the feelings and attitudes that money brings up in you and then to hold them in the light of this prayer:

Gracious God, looking back, we see the generosity of those who came before us, acknowledging their hardships and struggles, their joys and gains that bring us to the place we are now. In looking back, help us to build a foundation for those who will look back at our lives, those who will be affected by what we do, what we offer, what we give. Help us to rejoice in the knowledge that lives are being changed now and in the future because of what we are able to do with the gifts you give us, which we use and share in the name of the one who calls us, Jesus Christ. Amen.

NOVEMBER WORSHIP SERIES

It's a "Wonder-full" Life: Integrating Money and Meaning

"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." -John 10:10b

In the classic film, It's a Wonderful Life, a crisis of money creates vastly diverse reactions from several characters that can hold up a mirror to our own relationships with money. In this four-week series, we will "look" squarely in the face of our money issues in compassionate ways that can offer more meaning, healing and wholeness. As we bring money out of the shadows, we'll discover practices to help us live a life full of meaning and wonder -- a "wonder-full" life!

November 3 - Looking Back + Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

"So tell us what you think: Does the Law allow people to pay taxes to Caesar or not?"

-Matthew 22:15-22

Our relationship with money has a history as long as our lives but also as expansive as the family systems and culture of which we are a part. Our first spiritual practice when it comes to money invites us to look back, to see with new eyes how and when our values and fears came to be. We look back with compassion for ourselves and others and a faith that reminds us of our true worth.

November 10 - Looking In + November Birthday Blessing

"Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." -Matthew 6:19-24

In the film *It's a Wonderful Life*, George Bailey gets a wonderful gift of seeing what the world would have been like without him in it. We live an "incarnational" faith-the belief that, like Jesus, our faith is not just an idea, but it gets lived out in our actions in the world. This week we explore our vision for our presence and impact in the world, a vision that guides how we "spend" our assets-time, energy, and money.

November 17 - Looking Out + Noisy Offering

FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

Per Capita – What is it?

PER CAPITA is "the tie that binds"—annual support that unites the entire denomination in the ongoing and essential work that guides the Office of the General Assembly, the life of the PCUSA and benefits every congregation and every mid council ministry (presbyteries and synods). It supports work such as:

- Partnering with ecumenical bodies worldwide to promote Christian unity
- Providing support in identifying and developing pastoral leadership (both with new pastors and "old" pastors)
- Providing funding to bring presbyteries, synods and congregations together for training and other events.
- PER CAPITA supports the costs of our Presbytery of East Iowa stated meetings (five times per year), as well as the stated meetings of the Synod of Lakes and Prairies (three times per year) and the biannual General Assembly. This includes subsidizing meal costs, childcare, printing, mileage, etc.

To recognize our shared connection with Presbyterians nationwide, our church pays an assessed fee (\$38 in 2019) on behalf of each member to the governing bodies of our church (presbytery, synod, general assembly).

The total cost of our per capita assessment for 2019 is \$5,045. If you would like to recognize our connection to the PC(USA) by paying your own assessment, simply mark your check "per capita." Thank you!


