TER FROM PASTOR LORI

"I invite you, therefore, in the name of Christ, to observe a holy Lent by self-examination and penitence, by prayer and fasting, by works of love, and by meditating on God's word." The Book of Common Worship (2018), p. 250

The season of Lent has begun. What are we to do with it, about it? In the liturgy for Ash Wednesday, which marks the first day of Lent, we are invited to "observe a holy Lent."

Growing up in a Presbyterian church in the 70s and 80s, Lent was not a thing. I didn't know about it until college and have felt like I've never quite figured out the best practices for me. I usually choose a book or a devotional to read, and then I make a renewed effort with my usual spiritual practices of early morning prayer and meditation. (For some reason, I almost always fall off in January and February.) I'll be doing that again this year, including using the devotionals that accompany our worship series, Wilderness.

But there's another spiritual practice I plan to take on this year—noticing one tiny beautiful thing each day. It comes from an article sent to me by a friend, "One Tiny Beautiful Thing" by Margaret Renkl (New York Times, February 23, 2020). Living in the South where the rain has been torrential and destructive, Renkl has found herself despairing climate change along with our national scene. Then one day while walking in the woods, she noticed tiny seedlings high up in the knothole of a tree.

Those seedlings were for Renkl "that ordinary miracle, that commonplace resurrection, that everlasting antidote to the temporary perfidy" of the difficulty of our days. And so for Lent she will take on the practice of noticing and offering to others as many ordinary miracles as she can each day.

I found that idea compelling. And then in my reading this second day of Lent was this (from Always We Begin Again by John McQuiston III):

> Life will always provide matters for concern. Yet each day brings with it reasons for joy.

Each day carries the potential to bring the experience of heaven; have the courage to expect good from it.

FEBRUARY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session met Wednesday, February 12, 2020 at 6:30 pm in the Community Room.

Present: Ed Bjork, Wendy Dorn-Recalde (ruling elder-elect), Carole Frazee, Scott Larson (to be installed), Scott Peterson, Larry Petrick, Larry Purvis, Jonathan Walsh, Moderator Lori Wunder

Excused: Carol Daly, Pat Hogan, Greg West, Teresa Sullivan (ruling elder-elect)

We opened our meeting by reading through and discussing "A Brief Statement of Faith," written in 1983 on the occasion of the PC(US) and UPC(USA) denominations coming together as the PC(USA). Commissioner Larry Petrick and Pastor Lori Wunder reported what happened at the 191st Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of East Iowa. One highlight was the approval of a \$25,000 gift from the PEIA towards Camp Wyoming's High Ropes and Challenge Course Project (to be built fall 2020) and up to \$25,000 matching grant for gifts made by PEIA congregations.

Action Items:

- Approved paying back \$8930 borrowed from the Miscellaneous account for 2019 shortfall using funds from Edward Jones account.
- Approved Camp Wyoming High Ropes Course as a Noisy Offering recipient

Discussion Items:

- Reviewed the 2019 Annual Report and discussed what we might do in the coming years:
 - Consider additional, new fundraisers. Create a subcommittee for this purpose?
 - Schedule a Saturday afternoon conversation and planning with anyone from the congregation to get ideas (Scott Larson and Pastor Lori will plan)?
 - Bring back Committee Night for dinner, fellowship, renewed committees/teams?
 - Consider sending a weekly email with bulletin and announcements?
- Pastor Lori will schedule a meeting with the Finance Committees and a few others to discuss our long-term financial picture.
- Set New Officer Training for Sunday, February 16 from 1:00–3:30 in the Community Room. All Ruling Elders currently serving on Session are encouraged to attend.

FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT- March 1

Matthew 4:1-11 (Jesus resists temptation in the wilderness)

Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7 (Adam and Eve eat from the tree of knowledge)

Much of who we are is shaped by the wilderness. Made in the image of God, Adam and Eve discover how easy it is to get stuck in human brokenness. Jesus finds his sense of call in the wilderness, as his ministry becomes defined by what he resists: hunger (feeding the hungry) and power (finding power in servanthood).

SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT- March 8

John 3:1-17 (Nicodemus questions being born again) | Psalm 121 ("I lift my eyes to the hills") Sometimes the wilderness mystifies and scares us. Nicodemus comes to Jesus by night, desperate for concrete answers to swallow up his doubt. Instead, Jesus offers him poetry and mystery, pointing him to the wildness of the Spirit. The hymn of Psalm 121 reminds us of the power of song when trudging through difficult or perilous wilderness spaces. In the wilderness of seeking justice, our songs give us courage and strength to climb even the highest of hills.

THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT- March 15

John 4:5-42 (The Samaritan woman at the well) | Exodus 17:1-7 (The Israelites thirst in the wilderness) The Israelites experience the full spectrum of emotions the wilderness incites—doubt and disillusionment, disorientation and disconnection. Memories of their liberation fade as their thirst deepens and they ask, "Is the Lord among us or not?" In John's gospel, Jesus greets a woman of Samaria—a foreign land Jesus chooses to go through, not around—and transforms her personal wilderness into living waters.

FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT- March 22; Howard Chapman, preaching

John 9:1-41 (Jesus heals a man born blind) | Psalm 23 ("The Lord is my shepherd")

Healing is a wilderness journey. The story of the man born blind shows us that sometimes we get worse before we get better, as his healing journey requires mud across his eyes and plunging into a pool he is forbidden to touch. In the familiar words of Psalm 23, we find comfort in God's loving guidance even through the valley of the shadow of death.

FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT- March 29

John 11:1-45 (Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead) | Ezekiel 37:1-14 (The valley of dry bones)
Feeling stuck or depressed, navigating a failing marriage or working a job you hate, living with illness or chronic pain— these are all valleys of dry bones. In these spaces, we pray for God's breath to rattle us toward becoming whole. The story of Lazarus reminds us of the wilderness of grief, as Martha's response to her brother's death captures the way we, too, might protest death, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."
