Like most of us, typos happen to me. A lot. Some words I don't know how to spell, but usually there is a communication problem between my brain and my fingers.

Recently, I made a typo that actually made me stop and think.

The Epistle October 2014 Volume 2014-10 "Re-Story" Ourselves While working on a summary of where we've been so far with the stories in the Narrative Lectionary, instead of spelling "destroy" (as in, God decided to destroy the world by sending the great flood), my fingers instead typed "destory." And it got me thinking. Maybe there is a connection between "destroy" and "de-story?" There is much destroying going on in our world today—wars and conflicts, the threat of violence woven into daily life, a message of fear and scarcity used to sell us everything

from toothpaste to political candidates, the fear and suspicion of anything and anyone that is different, not to mention the stresses and pressures of daily life that wear us down, fray us around the edges, pull us away from what is most important to us, and disconnect us from our true selves, our true centers.

I can't help thinking that at the heart of this destruction is a tendency to "de-story," to cut ourselves off from others who are different than us or share different views, to even deny that another person or group's story is even valid or true. Or we listen to the wrong story, the drumbeat to do more and be more, to turn to products for the solution to what we think ails us. Between social media and the variety of news sources available to us, it is so easy to be "siloed," selecting only those things that reinforce the viewpoints we already hold.

Part of the reason I am so drawn to the Narrative Lectionary is it helps put us back in communication with God's Story, the story not just of life "back then" but life now. God's Story tells us over and over again that

We are loved, and we are created for good.

God blesses us not just for ourselves alone but for the benefit of all the world. We need God, and we need one another.

I am convinced that what we are called to do as people of faith is to "re-story" ourselves by doing two things:

- Immersing ourselves in God's story so that it becomes the framework through which we make sense of our world and our lives
- Deliberately listening to others tell their stories, particularly those whose story is very different than our own, so that we can grow in understanding, love, and compassion.

I am convinced that this is what God is calling me to do in such a time as this. If you are interested in joining me in figuring out ways we can do this as a congregation and into the wider community, let me know!

Financial Update...

Building Loan Update

As of September 30, 2014, the amount due on our building loan is \$89,055.66! We have just under \$21,000 in the New Building Account and anticipate another \$41,000 will be received in pledges in the next two years. After that, the payment will become part of our general budget.

Over the summer, we signed a new loan agreement with Mount Vernon Bank and Trust at 3.90% interest rate and a monthly payment of \$2748.00. We are on schedule to have *our building loan (originally* \$350,0000) PAID OFF on July 25, 2017! Thank you all for your continued generosity and faithfulness!

General Fund

The news here continues to be very mixed. We knew from the beginning that we were looking at a deficit budget for 2014 and we have already loaned ourselves \$8000 this year.

The good news is, we have reserves that we can dip into to keep the bills paid. We are very, very grateful for the generosity of generations past that keep us afloat today!

The bad news is, relying on those reserves cannot go on forever. And the truth is, we could use those reserves in other ways—to fund a new ministry project or support an organization already doing good things in the world.

During the last few months, we have received \$4000 in financial gifts above and beyond pledges to go toward the budget deficit. We are so grateful to the individuals who were able and willing to support our mission and ministry in this way!

Might you be able to join them? Please prayerfully consider if you are in a position to make an additional gift this year.

Know, too, that we are not alone in this. Churches in our area and across the country are facing ever tightening budgets. Considering we are also paying off a building loan, we are actually in better situation than many. This is entirely due to all of YOU!

Sunday Morning, October 26th How Do We Live Into Our Vision? An All-Congregation Conversation following Worship

Last spring, our Visioning Task Force presented a visioning statement and cultural characteristics intended to guide our congregation into the future:

Striving to live as Jesus lived: confronting injustice with love, compassion, service. Creative. Progressive. Serving. Accepting.

Over the summer, we dipped a toe into those waters on three Sundays, hearing from Kory May about three courageous young men who risked their lives to stand up against racial injustice, Joe Jennison about his experience as a gay man feeling excluded from the church, and Catherine Quehl-Engel about the necessity of centering ourselves in God through prayer and meditation. We had wonderful attendance and enthusiastic response—both from congregation and community—to each of these worship services.

Now we want to hear from you. What would it look like for us to live out our vision and these cultural characteristics, both inwardly and outwardly?

Craig Engel will lead us through this process. Our morning will begin with an abbreviated worship service in the style of Taizé (including prayer, readings, silence, and singing), then we will move into our time of conversation and brainstorming.

Worship in October Back to the Story: Narrative Lectionary

This year, we are once again using the Narrative Lectionary, a weekly walk through the big stories of the Bible in order.

During the first six weeks (September 7 through October 12), we have read parts of six pivotal stories about God continually seeking to be relationship with humankind by making covenants. We began with God's covenant with every breathing thing after the flood, then moved to God's covenant to Abraham and Sarah to bless them to be a blessing, and then watched that covenant fulfilled in God's faithfulness to their descendents through Joseph, and when God delivering the Israelites from slavery in Egypt.

This Colors of the Covenant series concludes the first two Sundays in October:

October 5 - Covenant and Commandments

Exodus 19:3-7; 20:1-17 Through Moses, God and Israel renew the covenant and gives the ten commandments.

October 12 – Joshua Renews the Covenant

Joshua 24:1-15 After the people have settled into the Promised Land, Joshua leads the people in renewing the covenant.

In our next series, we explore stories that show us what the covenant looks like from the perspective of the people. What does it mean to be God's people? What does it look like? How then shall we live?

Series 2: How Then Shall We Live?

October 19-November 23

October 19 - Nathan and David and Bethsheba and Uriah

2 Samuel 12:1-9, Psalm 51:1-9 After David's "indiscretion" with Bathsheba, the prophet Nathan tells a parable that moves David to repentance.

October 26 - Solomon's Wisdom

1 Kings 3:4-15 Given the chance to ask the Lord for anything he wishes, Solomon asks for wisdom in order to lead the people well.

Note: Worship will be in the style of Taizé

Includes scripture readings, prayers, singing, and times of silent reflection Following worship, all are invited to participate in a congregation-wide brainstorm about ways we can live into our vision (see page X).
